January 2019 Newsletter

From the Superintendent's desk:

I want to welcome everyone back for the start of the second semester. I hope you had an awesome Christmas and New Year's holiday season and were able to spend some quality time with your family and friends because January is a very busy month filled with many school activities. As a reminder, our 2nd semester will begin on Thursday, January 3, 2019.

My January newsletter will focus on school safety and our new Standard Response Protocol that has been implemented into our school. I want to thank our new Safety/Threat Assessment Team comprised of Barbara Lovercheck, Cami Oelsligle, Tony Miller, Matt Bertrand, Brice King, Kandee Hanzel and myself for their time and commitment to making our school as secure and safe as possible. I first introduced the Standard Response Protocol to the Board of Education at the November school board meeting and then to our staff and student body in December prior to the end of the first semester. We will be carrying out intruder drills on a monthly basis similar to fire drills so our staff and students know exactly what to do during a "Lockout" or a "Lockdown." It is my goal to explain what Standard Response Protocol is and share the information with our parents and community members should we ever have a "Lockout" or "Lockdown."

THE STANDARD RESPONSE PROTOCOL

A critical ingredient in the safe school recipe is the uniform classroom response to an incident at school. Weather events, fires, accidents, intruders and other threats to student safety are scenarios that are planned and trained for by school and district administration and staff.

Standard Response Protocol Is ACTION Based



The Standard Response Protocol is based not on individual scenarios but on the response to any given scenario. Standard Response Protocol demands a specific vocabulary. The premise is simple – there are four (4) specific actions that can be performed during an incident. When communicating these actions, the action is labeled with a "Term of Art" and is then followed by a "Directive". Execution of the action is performed by active participants, including students, staff, teachers and first responders.



1. **Lockout** is followed by the Directive: "Secure the Perimeter," is repeated twice each time the public address is performed and is the protocol used to safeguard students and staff **WITHIN** the building.



2. **Lockdown** is followed by "Locks, Lights, Out of Sight," is repeated twice each time the public address is performed and is the protocol used to secure individual rooms and keep students quiet and in place.



3. **Evacuate** is always followed by a location and is used to move students and staff from one location to a different location in or out of the building and is repeated twice each time the public address is performed.



4. **Shelter** is always followed by the hazard, a safety strategy and is the protocol for group and self-protection and is repeated twice each time the public address is performed.

These specific actions can act as both a verb and a noun. If the action is Lockdown, it would be announced on public address as "Lockdown! Locks, Lights, Out of Sight." Communication to local Law Enforcement Agency would then be "We are under Lockdown." You **MUST** understand that each response has specific student and staff action. The Evacuate response is always followed by a location: "Evacuate to the Bus Zone." Responses can also be chained. For instance, "Evacuate to Hallway. Shelter for Tornado. Drop, Cover and Hold."

BENEFITS

The benefits of Standard Response Protocol become quickly apparent. By standardizing the vocabulary, everyone can understand the response and status of the event. For students, this provides continuity of expectations and actions throughout their educational career. For teachers, this becomes a simpler process to train and drill. For first responders, the common vocabulary and protocols establish a greater predictability that persists through the duration of an incident. **Parents can easily understand the practices and can reinforce the protocol.** Additionally, this protocol enables rapid response determination when an unforeseen event occurs.

The protocol also allows for a more predictable series of actions as an event unfolds. An intruder event may start as a Lockdown, but as the intruder is isolated, first responders would assist as parts of the school go to an "Evacuate to the Gym and Lockdown," and later "Evacuate to the Bus Zone."

What is the Difference between LOCKOUT VS LOCKDOWN





The differentiation between Lockout and Lockdown is a critical element in Standard Response Protocol. A **Lockout** recovers all students from outside the building, secures the building perimeter and locks all outside doors. It should be announced with the directive "Secure the Perimeter" which Humphrey Public already has all exterior doors locked. This would be implemented when there is a **threat or hazard outside** of the building. Criminal activity, dangerous events in the community, or even a vicious dog on the playground would be examples of a Lockout response. While the Lockout response encourages greater staff situational awareness, it allows for educational practices to continue with little classroom interruption or distraction.

The term **Lockdown** is a classroom-based protocol that requires locking the classroom door, turning off the lights and placing students out of sight of any corridor windows and remain hidden until first responders arrive. Student action during Lockdown is to remain quiet. Humphrey Public School has ALL outside doors locked at all times during the school day and during a lockdown.

There may be situations where both Lockdown and Lockout need to be performed, but in this case, they are identified individually. "Lockout! Secure the Perimeter. Lockdown! Locks, Lights, out of Sight." would be announced on public address. We are in "Lockdown and Lockout" would be conveyed to emergency services or 911.

Effectively if the threat is outside the building, Lockout. If the threat is inside the building, Lockdown.

TACTICAL RESPONSES

Standard Response Protocol also acknowledges that some school incidents involve a tactical response from law enforcement and suggests consultation with local law enforcement regarding expectations and actions.

Standard Response Protocol In A Nutshell and has Specific Actions:

Each protocol has specific staff and student actions that are unique to the action.



LOCKOUT - Get Inside. "SECURE THE PERIMETER"

Lockout is called when there is a threat or hazard outside of the school building.

Students are trained to:

- Return to inside of building
- Do business as usual

Teachers are trained to:

- Recover students and staff from outside building
- Increased situational awareness
- Do business as usual
- Take roll, account for students



LOCKDOWN - "LOCKS, LIGHTS, OUT OF SIGHT"

Lockdown is called when there is a threat or hazard inside the building.

Students are trained to:

- Move away from sight
- Maintain silence

Teachers are trained to:

- Lock classroom door
- Lights out
- · Move away from sight
- Maintain silence
- Do not open the door, wait for First Responders to open door
- Take roll, account for students

One of the last things I want to share with both parents and students is this; the drills we conduct with students and staff are serious, we are drilling to save lives. A phrase I found useful when talking with students is, "I'm trying to keep you safe. I am not going to apologize for trying to save you. As you visit our school, part of Humphrey Public School's commitment to the Standard Response Protocol is displaying posters in all classrooms, libraries, cafeterias, gymnasiums and hallways. We hope this communicates what our expectations are during times of this protocol.

As always, I want to end my newsletter as I normally do by saying should you ever have any questions, please call and get the answers. Clear and open communication between the community and the school are vital areas in the success of our school.

- 2. As you all continue to think about future careers, I highly encourage you to consider going on Job Shadows. The best way to determine if a career is for you is to get out and


- see what goes on in that career. I can help you get registered for a Job Shadow if you need assistance.

6th Grade News

Things are busy in the sixth grade room this year. We have 17 students in our class and have been working hard on many different things.

In reading class we have been working on genres, main ideas, context clues, figurative language, Greek and Latin roots, and there are always new vocabulary words with each story we read. With this being the first year for our new Reading series, it is interesting seeing how things are presented differently. Our phonics class goes over syllables, digraphs, consonant clusters, and the different meanings of various prefixes and suffixes.

English brings work on the basics of grammar: sentence structure, nouns, verbs, adjectives, adverbs, etc. We also spend time writing different types of essays.

In Math we are covering adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing decimals, fractions, and integers. Second semester gets a lot more into ratios, percents, equations, and geometry.

Note taking is a big part of both Science and Social Studies for us. It helps us group together the most important parts of the sections we read in our textbooks. Science has us discussing elements, atoms, compounds, gravity, electricity, space, nature, and the human body. Ancient civilizations are our focus in Social Studies. We cover everything from cavemen, to Mesopotamia, Egypt, India, China, and Greece first semester. This spring we will work our way through Rome, Arabia, Africa, Europe, Asia, and Ancient America.

With all these things to keep us busy-homework, quizzes, and tests-we should never get bored!

Cold Weather Preparedness Tips

In the Car

- Fully check and winterize your vehicle before starting your travel: Make sure your car battery has enough power, and your car is filled with antifreeze.
- Keep your gas tank near full to prevent ice from forming in the fuel lines.
- If you are planning travel, carry a winter storm survival kit:
 - ✓ Blankets
 - **√** Flashlight
 - ✓ High-calorie snack foods
 - ✓ Jumper cables
 - A water container.
 - Make sure your cell phone is fully charged.

At Home

- Let your faucets drip to prevent freezing water from causing pipes to burst.
- Make sure your pipes are properly insulated and leave cabinet doors open around pipes to ensure they receive warmth from the air flowing through your home.
- ✓ Protect/Bring inside outdoor plants.
- Provide shelter for pets and check on elderly.
- Have a flashlight and extra batteries available. Avoid using candles since these can become a fire hazard.
- If you have a fireplace or wood stove, make sure you have a good supply of firewood. Learn to use any emergency heating sources properly to prevent a fire.
- Close off unneeded rooms and place towels or rags in cracks under the doors.



- Clothing
- Wear loose-fitting, lightweight clothing in several layers.
 This is more effective in creating insulation for your body.
- Wear a hat. Nearly half of your body heat loss is from the top of your head.
- Wear gloves or mittens (mittens which are snug at the wrist are better than gloves).
