From the Superintendent's desk:

I'm not sure but I believe the older I get, the more I dislike the winter season. It has been one long winter with the snow and cold temperatures, I can't wait for some 70-degree temperatures and the Spring season.

I want to thank Mrs. Hogancamp, National Honor Society sponsor and the National Honor Society students for all their time and work with our student body and staff for raising over \$1,387.00 for the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and the Northeast Nebraska Animal Shelter in Norfolk, NE. Mrs. Hogancamp and the NHS students donated 693.55 to St. Jude's and 693.55 to the Animal Shelter and presented the checks to the two charities during a pep rally on Friday, February 22. Thank you to all of our students and staff who contributed money for these two awesome charities.

As of Tuesday, February 26, we added the Preschool information for the 2019-2020 school year on our school website as well as advertising the Preschool application in the February 27 and March 6 editions of the Humphrey Democrat. You can access the information on the school website at http://www.humphreybulldogs.org/, go to the Elementary school heading, click on it and you should see the preschool heading which contains the Preschool Acceptance Criteria, Registration form along with the Preschool Handbook. Humphrey Public School will begin taking preschool applications for the 2019-2020 school year on Monday, March 4. Children born between August 1, 2014 and July 31, 2016 are eligible to attend. Students must be fully toilet trained before the first day of school. You are also welcome to stop by the office to pick up a registration form or you can download the form from the school website. Registration forms must be returned in person to Mr. Sjuts or Mr. King and are due by 3:30 p.m. on Monday, April 8, 2019. If you have any questions, please contact Mr. King or myself as we would be happy to help you.

I will be discussing the 2019-2020 school calendar with the school board for their approval in March or April, this calendar will also include the preschool calendar. One of the possible changes is moving the graduation date one week earlier in 2020 to accommodate the students who may qualify for the National speech meet. By changing the date, this will prevent qualifying speech students from having to choose between participating in our graduation ceremony or attending the National Speech meet. We have typically had graduation on the Saturday of Mother's Day weekend. I would appreciate hearing your thoughts on this potential change, please stop by my office, send me an email or give me a call at school.

Finally, I want to wish good luck to the Humphrey Speech coaches and team as they will be participating in the Class D1-2 District Speech meet at Bancroft on Wednesday, March 13. As I do with all my newsletters, I want to emphasize to our patrons in the district; should you ever have any questions, please call and get the answers. This will help curb misinformation and eliminate rumors and your concerns. Clear and open communication between the community and the school are vital areas in the success of our school.

- can have a huge effect on your future. Do what you can to prepare now so there are no regrets in the future!
- 2. Also, keep looking into colleges and future careers. If you need help setting up college visits or job shadows, please let me know. Both visits and shadows are very important ways in helping to determine future plans.

12th Grade:

- 1. It is scholarship season! I have sent out any scholarship that I am aware of. Please, take the time to read through them and see if you qualify. If you do qualify, take the time to fill out the scholarship. Remember, it is free money, and when you're in college, that is beyond lovely.
- 2. Many scholarships require letters of recommendation. When asking for these letters, provide the writer with adequate time to complete a solid recommendation. It also may be necessary to remind them if you have once asked, but remember to ask in a polite and respectful manner.
- 3. Have someone proof read your scholarship application. Sometimes, the determining factor is grammar. Make sure that you are not one who is not chosen because of this.
- 4. Be sure to finish the year strong. Although it is rare, if your academics slip drastically due to a lack of effort, colleges have reversed acceptance. On that note of colleges, if you have narrowed down your search, log into your college's portal and make sure all necessary information has been received. There may be financial aid awards to accept/decline, housing documents to complete, or small fees to pay. If you are unsure of what to do, please come in and see me. We can talk about what all of the information means.

As always, please contact me with any concerns you might have. I will do my very best to answer the question myself, or I will do my best to find the answer. Many of you upperclassmen may be nervous and stressed. That is totally normal. Let me know if I can help ease those nerves or stress in any way.

March is Music In Our Schools Month! This is the month where we celebrate music education that is available for the students in our school! I happen to celebrate music education every day of every month!

I think we often take for granted the benefits the students at Humphrey Public Schools receive by having music as a part of their education. I recently watched a TedTalk by Anita Collins where she discusses the amazing activity found in the human brain by using FMRI and PET scanning devices. Participants

were asked to perform certain tasks, such as recall information and solve mathematical problems while their brains were being scanned. When the participants listened to music, Ms. Collins explains that the scans looked like "fireworks". More areas of the brain showed activity during music listening than performing any other activity. She explains that music education works three areas of the brain; the motor, aural and visual, all at once. It could be compared to a full body workout, instead of just having a "leg day", or an "arm day". Music education is an exercise for the entire brain. She goes on to explain that musicians have a larger "bridge", or corpus callosum, that allows messages travel more quickly and creatively back and forth between the brain hemispheres. Students that begin music education at a young age tend to have a more successful educational future, including better logical, conceptual and creative problem solving skills. Music education also allows students to gain confidence, cooperation skills, emotional intelligence and enjoy being creative! All people - not just the "talented" people - should be encouraged to pursue music education, as the benefits are infinite!

I am so grateful to provide our elementary students with musical opportunities. All elementary music students learn that music encompasses every other school subject that they encounter every day. Their reading fluency has the chance to improve as they read the lyrics to the music over and over again. Math skills are practiced as students learn to count rhythms and understand how the beat is divided. Science comes into play when they learn about sound and the frequency of vibrations. Social Studies seem to be discussed often when they sing songs from around the world and those of historical importance. The students find chances to compose their own lyrics and original rhythms and melodies. I have even been told before that they have worked up a sweat in music as much as they do in PE because of the movements and dancing we do! Needless to say, the elementary students are always busy in the elementary music room!

We are currently beginning to prepare for our <u>Spring concert!</u> Mark your calendars for April 30th, as you are invited to see what we are working on! The elementary students have been immersed in the magic of Mary Poppins this school year, so do not be surprised if you hear a few of the melodies composed by Richard and Robert Sherman for the classic Disney movie! Speaking of Disney movies, there are several classic musical masterpieces that need to be celebrated. Please plan to join the Kindergarten-6th grade students on April 30th!

Take some time this month to celebrate the music education your children are receiving at Humphrey Public Schools! I will do my best to provide ALL PEOPLE (STUDENTS) with ALL MUSIC to improve their lives as a whole!
