

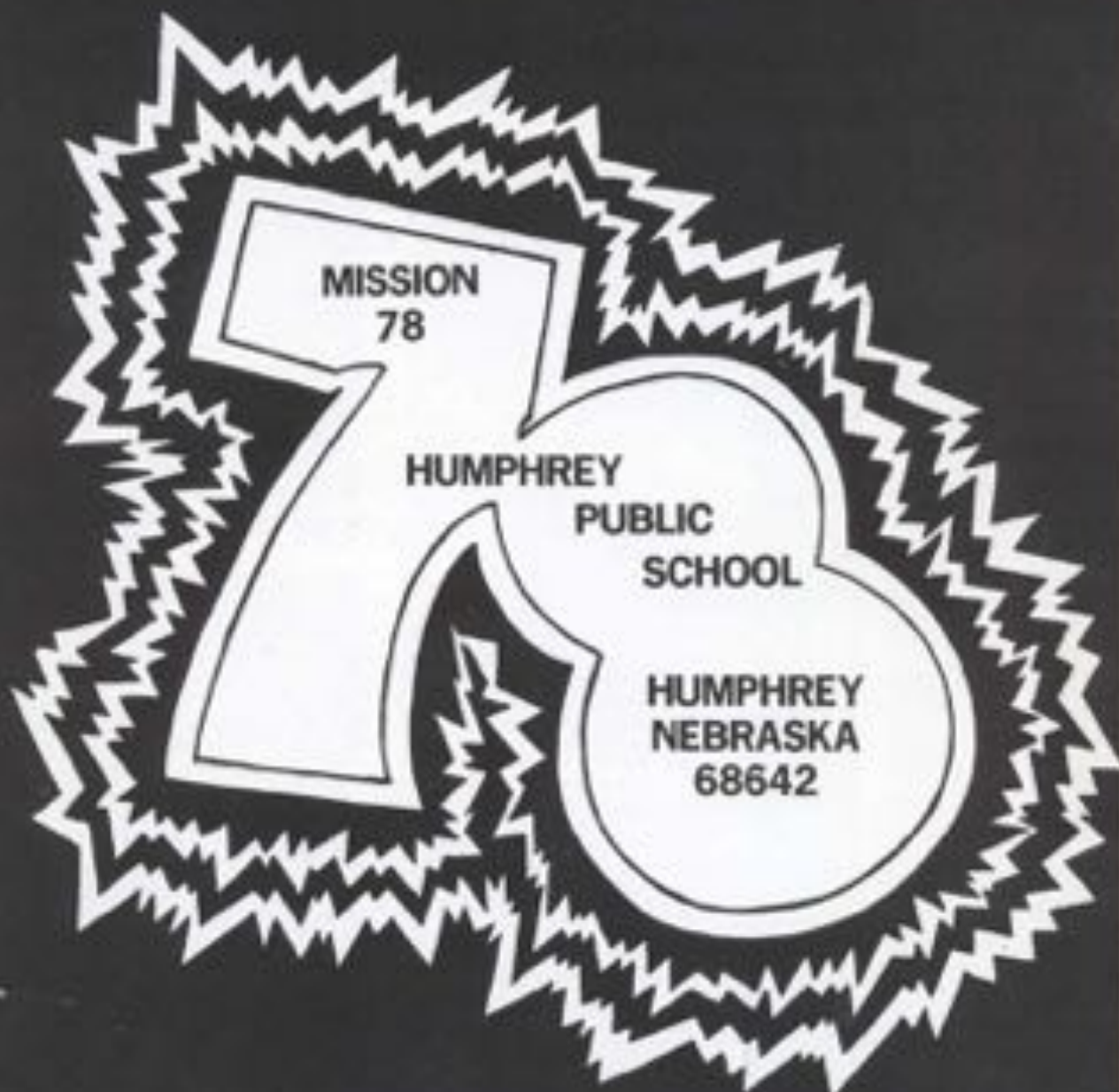

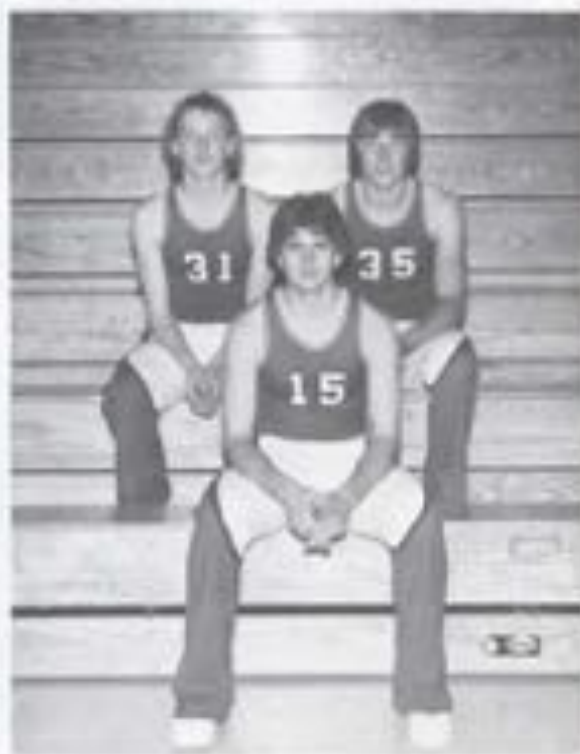
Even though five great Seniors have graduated, the mission for the future is to have just as successful a season or a better one.

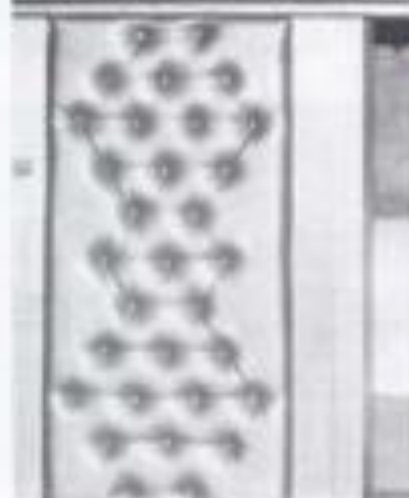

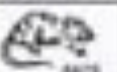

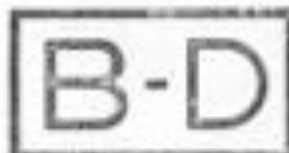
